BCFO RESEARCH GRANTS

BCFO encourages submissions of proposals for financial assistance for bird surveys and other Ornithological research. It also wishes to foster greater connection between applicants and the society. Potential applicants are reminded that:

- 1. Requests for funding must be for planned rather than completed projects.
- 2. Under normal circumstances applicants should be or be willing to become members of BCFO
- 3. Projects and their results are to be reported in BCFO's Journal **British Columbia Birds**.
- 4. In order for BCFO directors to give a timely response to project proposals deadlines for submission are January 1 and July 1.
- 5. All reasonable requests up to a \$1000 limit and within the financial strength of the organization will be considered, with any larger requests requiring approval at the AGM.
- 6. Applicants should obtain a copy of the grant policy and the application guidelines from a member of the executive before any submission.

A very successful trip was completed in March in the Parkville area lead by Guy Monty and other trips will be to the Skagit Valley/Hope Area in May, the pre conference tour in June, mentioned above, and the Fraser Delta/Boundary Bay in November. We are looking for other leaders to plan and lead other trips to their favourite spots. We are also using these trips to attract new members.

The board has also undertaken to update the BCFO website with the aims of attracting more members and to make membership registration and renewal easier. And, of course, our two publications: *British Columbia Birds: Journal of the British Columbia Field Ornithologists*; and *BC Birding* Newsletter are very important in keeping our members informed about what is happening in BCFO, and with birding and birders.

Rock Receives Scholarship

Simon Fraser University M. Sc. candidate Christine Rock received the Vancouver Natural History Society's 2010 scholarship to assist in her research on Brown-headed Cowbird nest parasitism on Yellow Warblers in the Revelstoke area. Christine gave very informative presentations on her work to the Burke Mountain Naturalists, the Langley Field Naturalists and the birders' section of VNHS, as well as a shorter version to the BCFO annual general meeting in Revelstoke. Some of us also enjoyed visiting one of her study areas with her during the field trips portion of the AGM. –based partly on Anonymous. 2010. *Vancouver Naturalist* 12(2):6.

Vancouver Birders Awarded

As usual, birds figure at least peripherally in the contributions recognized by most of the awards given out at the AGM of the Vancouver Natural History Society in April 2010. Former VNHS and Federation of B.C. Naturalists President Jeremy McCall received the society's premier award, the Kay and Charles Ney Award for his past and current service to both of these organizations in many positions, several involving birds (G. Bangham. 2010. *Van. Nat.* 12(2):7). Another former Federation of B.C. Naturalists President, Anne Murray, was awarded the Davidson Award for Conservation in recognition of her efforts as chair/co-chair of the Federation's Conservation Committee, her two books on Boundary Bay, her role in helping to found the Boundary Bay Conservation Committee and her contributions in obtaining official designations of Boundary Bay and/or the Fraser River estuary as the Boundary Bay Wildlife Management Area, an Important Bird Area and part of the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network (J. McCall. 2010. *Vancouver Nat.* 12(2):8). Mark Habdas received one of six Garibaldi service awards for his contribution of numerous outstanding photographs to various Nature Vancouver publications and posters, his participation in monthly bird surveys on Iona and Sea islands and his advocacy efforts on conservation issues, most recently control and licensing of domestic cats (A. Grant Duff. 2010. *Vancouver Nat.* 12(2):9).

Birch Van Horne

One of the Chilliwack Field Naturalists' most prominent members, Harold Bircham Van Horne, died on 23 April 2010 at the age of 96. An article on his contributions indicated that he participated annually in the local Christmas bird count (Anonymous. 2010. *B.C. Nature* 48(2):13).

Federation Awards

As usual, birds feature at least peripherally in all six of the most recent awards presented by B.C. Nature. Birds feature prominently in the Regional Awards given to Ann Nightingale of Victoria, who has coordinated the Victoria Christmas Bird Count since 2002, taught bird courses, contributed substantially to the work of the Rocky Point Bird Observatory, and served as regional co-coordinator of the B.C. Breeding Bird Atlas among other activities and to Robert Handfield, whose many contributions to Okanagan natural history include the development, organization and production of a book on Okanagan Valley birding. The premier Elton Anderson Award was presented to Harold King, who co-coordinated one of the Okanagan Christmas Bird Counts with his late wife for over ten years and contributed substantially to several Okanagan conservation efforts.

Sealy Award for Teaching

Spencer G. Sealy of the University of Manitoba received the 2009 Jamie Smith Mentoring Award in Ornithology from the Society of Canadian Ornithologists (Anonymous. 2010. [University of Manitoba] Faculty of Science News April 2010:7]. Spencer's Ph.D. thesis was based on research conducted on alcids in B.C. and Alaska and he continues to publish papers based on B.C. research and observations.

Loss of Two Whooping Crane Champions

Although not quite B.C. news, most B.C. birders and ornithologists will be interested to learn of the recent passing of two biologists who played significant roles in the partial recovery of Whooping Crane populations. A scholarship announcement (Anonymous. Science Contours 23(1):19, 2010) refers to a June 2010 memorial service for Dr. William A. (Bill) Fuller, former Chair of the Department of Zoology at the University of Alberta. When Whooping Cranes had ceased to breed in all known nesting sites and extensive surveys for the nesting area of the tiny last flock that wintered in Aransas National Park in Texas had failed to locate any nests, Bill observed nesting cranes in the Northwest Territories portion of Wood Buffalo National Park while he was conducting aerial surveys of the park's mammal herds. Ernie Kuyt, the biologist assigned by the Canadian Wildlife Service to monitor this flock, passed away in Edmonton on 21 May 2010 at the age of 81 (Anonymous. 2010. Nature Alberta 40(1):11). Ernie not only monitored the cranes for 25 years, but was the key biologist involved with applying colour bands to help monitor their movements, with taking one egg from two-egg clutches for artificial incubation to increase the chances that at least one egg would survive the hazardous incubation period and with participating with U.S. officials in transferring some of those eggs to Sandhill Crane nests at other sites to help establish flocks that would winter in areas other than the hurricane-susceptible Aransas wintering area. These efforts helped increase the population to a somewhat less hazardous level.) MKM

B.C. Students Awarded

Two of five Society of Canadian Ornithology student awards for 2010 went to students at B.C. universities and a third was awarded to a Manitoba student who was prominent in the B.C. ornithology community prior to starting graduate studies and continues to publish on B.C. birds (I. Warkentin. 2010. *Picoides* 23(2):6-9). The Fred Cooke Award was presented to Marie-Helene Burle of Simon Fraser University for studies on the mating system and breeding ecology of the Tuamotu Sandpiper, an endangered species now restricted to four atolls in French Polynesia. Amanda Edworthy of the UBC Forest Sciences Centre received a Junco Technologies Award for studies on tree cavity persistence and re-use by birds and mammals. Kyle Elliott's Ph.D. studies at the University of Manitoba received a James L. Baillie Award for studies on effects of aging on metabolic rates of long-lived Arctic seabird species.

Osprey Elevated and Wrens Split

The latest (51st) supplement to the American Ornithologists' Union's check-list of North American birds (R. T. Chesser et al. 2010. Auk 127:726-744) contains numerous changes to the taxonomy and nomenclature of North American birds, as usual. Those that affect the B.C. list follow. Black Scoter, Melanitta nigra has been split into Black and American (M. americana) scoters, with the latter the North American species. Tropicbirds have been split out of the order Pelecaniiformes into their own order Phaethontiformes. Frigatebirds, gannets and boobies, cormorants and anhingas have all also been transferred from Pelecaniiformes into a new order Sulidae. This would leave only pelicans in Pelecaniiformes, but they have been joined by herons (Ardeidae) and ibises and spoonbills (Threskiornithidae), leaving storks alone in Ciconiiformes. Osprey is elevated to a monotypic family, Pandionidae. Falcons (Falconidae) have been transferred out of Accipitriformes into a separate order (Falconiformes). Whip-poor-will has been split into two species, Eastern Whip-poor-will and Mexican Whip-poor-will. Winter Wren (Troglodytes troglodytes) has been split into three species, with Winter Wren (T. hiemalis) and Pacific Wren (T. pacifica) the two found in North America. Those found in B.C. are mostly Pacific, but Winter Wrens occur in the northeastern corner of the province, along with aspen parkland bird species. Gnatcatchers have been removed from the Old World Warbler family Sylviidae into their own family Polioptilidae. Tennessee, Orange-crowned and Nashville warblers have been removed from the genus Vermivora and placed into the new genus Oreothlypis. The waterthrushes have been removed from the genus Seiurus and placed in the new genus Parkesia. The longspurs and Snow and McKay's buntings have been

removed from the towhee/sparrow family Emberizidae and placed in a new separate family, Calcariidae. McCown's Longspur has been removed from *Calcarius* and given back its old genus *Rhynchophanes*. The order in which species are listed in some families has also been shuffled, as usual and several small passerine families have also been shuffled.

Gertrude (Trudy) Moore

The Birders' section of the Vancouver Natural History Society lost another prominent member when Gertrude (Trudy) Moore died in New Westminster on 21 September 2010. (Anonymous. 2010. Wandering Tattler 34(3):9). She attended most monthly meetings, usually with her sister, Ruth (Jones) Richmond, periodically bringing mesh bags of the hair of her long-haired dog for purchase by donation to aid in the work of the section. The compiler of these notes can attest to the welcome these bags received by Black-capped Chickadees, as those at his former Canada Way, Burnaby home began to remove hair from such a bag within seconds of his hanging it on a tree. She was also an actively contributing member of the Orphaned Wildlife Rehabilitation Society (OWL) helping to landscape their property.

New Bird Alert

Russell Cannings (son of Dick) has started a province-wide computerized bird alert recently for reporting rare birds and "interesting bird trends." Fall 2010 Federation Awards

Birds feature prominently in the contributions recognized by McTaggart-Cowan Outstanding Naturalist Awards presented to Al Grass and Kiyoshi Takahashi at the fall 2010 meeting of the Federation of B.C. Naturalists in Langley. Takahashi was recognized for general nature writings in both English and Japanese, photographic contributions, nature recordings and supplying bat and bird houses for bats, Barn Owls and Purple Martins in various parks in the "lower mainland." Birds also feature prominently in the numerous field trips, park lectures, newspaper articles, journal notes, photographs and customer advice given or produced by well-rounded naturalist Al Grass through his many years as a provincial park naturalist, columnist, member of several naturalists and Wild Birds Unlimited staff member. Mike Griffin of the Burke Mountain Naturalists was given a Club Service Award for his many contributions to that club and the preservation of local parks and other natural areas. Raptor counts and local Christmas Bird Counts were the birdier items among his many contributions to the documentation and preservation of natural features in the Burke Mountain area. —based on Anonymous. 2010. *B.C. Nature* 48(4):9-10.

Prince George Tree Swallow Flies to Calgary Area

A Tree Swallow banded by Russ Dawson west of Prince George was recovered in 2010 on a nest-box trail 667 km. SE by veteran bander Donald J. Stiles near Didsbury, Alberta (near Calgary), an unusual pathway for this species. –based on B. Taylor and D. J. Stiles. 2010. Calgary Area Nest-box Monitors Annual Report 2010:6.

Shelley Lagoons: a must-visit en Route to Fort St John

A septic lagoon is not many people's idea of heaven, but there's one in Prince George that seems to me not far short, and any BCFO members heading to Fort St John in June is welcome to a conducted tour.

A Sharp-tailed Sandpiper, posing for my camera, certainly made me overlook the pong. Similar favours from a White-rumped Sandpiper almost made me a fan of the aroma. People look at me strangely when I say it, but there really is no place I'd rather be. Particularly when the wind is in the right direction.

I'd heard about the Shelley Lagoons soon after I'd moved in 2009 from Prince Edward Island to Prince George, and after finding a nice group of Long-billed Dowitchers on my first visit, returned with a camera and 500 mm lens. The Dowitchers had moved on, and I could only see a couple of peeps in the entire six-pond location. But since one of those peeps was the young Sharp-tailed Sandpiper – a bird that should have been in deepest Siberia – I had no cause for complaint.

Since that moment I've returned on many occasions, and seen most of BC's duck species, along with a good proportion of the fauna attracted to bodies of water – many shorebirds, Sora, Yellow-headed Blackbirds and so forth – though I missed a recent Avocet.

The Sharp-tailed taught me the importance of taking my camera with me. Just before writing this, I'd seen a group of Least Sandpipers mixing with something larger. A Semipalmated Sandpiper? But it did seem rather too large for a semi, so I spent nearly half an hour taking its portrait, and circulated a shot through the ncbird listserver. Fortunately, one of the viewers took a close look, and asked to see more photographs. The experts quickly agreed – It was a White-rumped Sandpiper, very rare for BC, and not seen in the central interior since 1997. Another triumph for the Shelley Sludge Lagoons. I'll be back often. The fragrance is addictive.

BCFO 2011 Extension Trip Fort St. John to Fort Nelson and Area June 12 – 15, 2011

Leader: Russell Cannings

Sun, June 12th

This afternoon will be an optional birding outing, and we will decide where to go based on what birds participants are interested in. After dinner we will visit the Taylor Flats area where there is a good chance of seeing Ruby-throated Hummingbird. After returning to Fort St. John, we will go to Watson Slough, where we hope to hear the ticking call of the Yellow Rail, and see the rare Nelson's Sharptailed Sparrow. We'll overnight at the Quality Inn Northern Grand Hotel.

Mon, June 13th

We'll get an early start today as we'll be covering a fair bit of ground. We'll head north from Fort St. John watching for Northern Hawk-Owls and Great Gray Owls perched along the roadside, before arriving at Pink Mountain mid-morning. Here we will hike around the summit searching for Rock Ptarmigan, Dusky Grouse, Horned Lark, and perhaps Rock Wren. In the subalpine willow/spruce scrub there is a chance of finding Gray-cheeked Thrush, and further down we should encounter a nice variety of songbirds. The black spruce bogs that carpet the lower flats of Pink Mountain are great for breeding Rusty Blackbird. After lunch we will drive north to Fort Nelson where we can squeeze in a bit of birding before checking into the Fort Nelson Ramada. After dinner, many people will probably want to relax, but if there is interest we could get out for an optional evening birding session. The sun doesn't set until fairly late in mid-June this far north so owling is probably out of the question!

Tues, June 14th

Another early start, as we'll be heading up the Liard Hwy toward the Northwest Territories. We'll stop at the Beaver Lake Recreation Site to look for Cape May Warbler and other songbirds. Continuing up to the Fort Nelson River, we will search for birds such as Philadelphia Vireo, Boreal Chickadee, Mourning Warbler, Bay-breasted Warbler, and White-winged Crossbill. After lunch we'll work our way back to Fort Nelson, stopping at Parker Lake to scope for water birds and listen for Yellow-bellied Flycatchers. Another optional after dinner outing will allow us to check out the Fort Nelson Sewage Lagoons and the Fort Nelson Airport for shorebirds, and Sandhill Cranes. We will overnight at the Ramada in Fort Nelson.

Wed, June 15th

This morning we'll visit a couple great birding sites close to Fort Nelson, before heading south back to Fort St. John. We can improvise a little bit today but essentially the tour ends in the early afternoon in Fort St. John.

Herring Spawn Tour Trip Report



On March 10 and 11, 2011, 14 hearty birders braved the cold wind and abundant rain in sunny Parksville on the BCFO's Herring Spawn Tour, led by local, Guy Monty. Due to the unseasonably cold winter, the Pacific Herring spawn was later than in recent years, but the fish did oblige us by coming ashore near French Creek on the final day of the tour, attracting many thousands of gulls. Although all of the birding was interesting, and the Parksville Qualicum area does offer some lovely scenery, the spectacle of huge swarms of gulls accompanied by over 50 Bald Eagles, all thrashing in the intertidal areas trying to catch herring, was the highlight of the trip. During all of this chaos, Guy found a juvenile Iceland Gull, which was a new species for most of us. Large flocks of scoters, Long-tailed Ducks, and Greater Scaup, all patiently waiting for herring eggs, were another memorable sight, as were the flocks of black Brant. Bird Listers' Corner 2010 Lists

Welcome back to Listers' Corner for the 2010 edition. After a one year hiatus, for various reasons, we are now back in BC Birding. I would like to thank Wayne Weber for his efforts since taking over the task in 2005. Along with the 2010 listings, the 2009 submissions are included as part of this report. You will note changes in the presentation of the figures this time around. The number under the "%" in the tables represents, as in previous years, the percentage of that individual's figure compared to the total species in that particular area/list. The "incr" column indicates the increase, if any, from the 2009 figure. If a 2009 figure was not received I have brought forward the 2008 number if one was available. Any figures brought forward from a previous listing are noted with a preceding "asterisk". As in the past if a member does not supply a submission for 2 consecutive years (shown in italics), that listing will be dropped on subsequent reports. An individual in bold print indicates that person had the largest increase from the previous year's report for that particular listing. Eye-track shading has been used to make it easier to read across the charts. I hope readers can find their way through the tables without problem.

Submissions were received from 53 members and improvement from the 35 in 2009. It should be noted only BCFO members in 2010 are included in this report with a few listings carried forward from 2009 members. It is hoped we will again see everyone's name on the 2011 membership list. A large percentage of submissions were received by email which is my personal preference of receipt. All email and mailed submissions, provided an email address was known for the mail-ins, were personally acknowledged. Also a reminder email was sent out mid January as a friendly reminder to previous submitters.

Now let's see who has been out there enjoying new sightings whether in BC, Canada, south of the border or around the World.

Let's start with the BC list which had the most submissions. For reasons know to most. Russ Cannings amassed an increase of 28 species. These came in his quest to top Mike Toochin's 2001 BC Big Year mark of 364. Russ finished with an impressive 373!! Kevin Neill continues to improve his list with a 12 species increase. Mike Toochin remains number one with Jo Anne MacKenzie moving into second spot one ahead of Dale Jensen.




The cover story from our March 2010 (Vol. 20 No. 1) newsletter regarding the incredible concentration of gulls feasting on herring caviar at Parksville has an interesting aftermath. What do these gulls find to feed on when the herring spawn is over?

At the Horseshoe Bay Ferry terminal a partial answer to this question was recorded on April 9th, 2010. Quite a number of Glaucous-winged Gulls were 'lined up' picking mussels from the floating pontoons. From caviar to mussels in the short span of a few weeks would certainly be a decided come-down!

Adapt or Perish!

When confronted with the juggernaut of human economic and population expansion all living things in this path face the alternatives: relocate, adapt or disappear. One local example showing adaptation is the Brewer's Blackbirds. Once almost a strictly rural species they are now frequently encountered in mall parking lots.

Two other examples of adaptation recorded recently were Cattle Egrets following mechanical sugar cane harvesters in Queensland and Australian White Ibis waiting on tables outside a fish and chip shop. (see photos) Getting within a foot or two of these ibis provided an unexpected observation. The dorsal scutes between this species toe joints were as neatly coloured silver as a woman might paint her toe nails, something almost impossible to observe in the wild.

The winter 2010 edition of *BC Birding* contained a request from Craig Ely of the Alaska Science Center for observations of Tundra Swans with blue neck bands.

On October 20, 2010, Carlo Giovanella, Meg Brown and I were birding along the old highway from Merritt to Kamloops when we observed, at Beaver Flats, a small group of Tundra Swans, which included an adult bird with a blue neck band. Having noted down the code, I was able to email the information of the sighting to Craig Ely. He replied the next day.

The bird we had observed was collared on July 20, 2010 as an adult male, near King Salmon, on the north end of the Alaska Peninsular.

Usually, the starting places and routes of the many migrants we observe can only be imagined. Sometimes, however, we get lucky and can connect a little more closely with a migrating bird, and contribute one small piece of information to those studying them. All the way from King Salmon Alaska to Merritt, BC – how cool is that?
